Visits and Visitors

The children in Year 3 enjoyed visiting The Alnwick Garden this term. They learnt about the deadly plants in The Poison Garden with the Deadly Nightshade being their favourite. The children demonstrated excellent listening skills towards the staff and asked lots of questions about the plants in the garden. The children finished off their day in the Alnwick Maze, where they had to use their listening and oral skills to find each other and make their way out. Mila said, "I loved going to The Poison Garden and it was so scary! The plants were protected in boxes so we couldn't touch them."

"This term, Year 6 have been working with the Newcastle United Foundation to take part in a series of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) workshops. We have completed a variety of tasks such as building electrical circuits, understanding binary and creating the longest possible paper chain. As well as building on our knowledge of STEM, the tasks also encouraged us to develop our teamwork, communication skills, leadership and confidence. We also made a trip to the NUCASTLE Foundation, where we had the chance to explore STEM through LEGO. We built LEGO robots and coded them to make them move. At the end, we got the chance to race our robots! I think overall it was my most enjoyable trip; I love working with NUFC because they allow us to experience things that we may not get a chance to do in school." — Omar, Y6





At the beginning of October, Year 2 ventured out to Seaton Sluice as part of their topic about how seas and oceans change. "After a trip on a coach, we met Sam and Brian at Seaton Sluice Community Centre where they explained what would happen during the day. Our first activity was rock pooling in our groups. We worked as a team to lift up rocks and place our nets underneath to tickle out the mini sea creatures. We caught some huge crabs, fish and many other exciting creatures. After sharing our findings with everyone, we headed back to the building for lunch. In the afternoon, we enjoyed a coastal walk and we could see St. Mary's Lighthouse being renovated in the distance to one side and all the way up to Blyth on the other. Sam explained to us that the hills in the area were called ballast hills because in the olden days when they took coal down to London, the ships had to have ballast on their return journey and this was dumped in the area before they could reload with coal. Before we left, we were met by a volunteer called Hugh who had especially opened The Watch House for us. He explained lots about the history of Seaton Sluice and how people were rescued from ship wrecks many years ago. Instead of rowing out to save them, they would shoot a rope out to their ship and haul them in. It was a really interesting and exciting trip.
